Book Review by Leverne McBeth

Can't We Talk About Something More Pleasant by Roz Chast

This non-fiction graphic novel is a memoir by Roz Chast. Roz is an only child, and she is dealing with aging parents. Roz's journey resonates with anyone who is a caregiver to elderly parents (the feelings of denial, avoidance, and distraction as she witnesses the transition of her parents). Roz shared her process of picking out an institution for her parents, and how her relationships shifted due to dementia. I appreciate Roz Chast's honest perspective on this topic. Adult children have a tough time processing their feelings and Roz was able to add humor and comfort. Due to the annotated photos and hand-printed text in the graphic novel, readers will feel like they are still reading a novel.
